Grass Cutting

The cutting of the grass paths between plots has been well underway over the last month or so as it has been wet and warm, conditions conducive to grass growth. The cutting team of 20 volunteers have, in addition to working on their plots, regularly cut the paths in and around the allotment; the Committee is extremely grateful for their time and commitment to this task. Almost 2 years ago, we purchased 2 battery operated mowers and installed recharging facilities in the mowing shed. They have proved to be a great investment for the future as we move away from a reliance on heavy, cumbersome petrol mowers.



As a consequence, the take up of female members offering their help in mowing the paths with these lighter mowers has increased - which is great!

In the meantime one of our new committee members, Ian, has been very active and successful in selling our old petrol operated machinery so boosting our accounts. Well done Ian.

Finally, it would help the path cutting team if plot holders cut their own internal edges regularly so that boundaries are clearly defined and keep the adjacent paths clear of discarded items including debris which can damage the cutting blades.

We have been struggling with the restocking of the Trading Shed with the numbers of volunteers dwindling and it would be a shame if we had to stop stocking bulky items because of the lack of support. So if Liz and Viv ask for help it would be good if we all did a turn and not leave it to the few stalwarts who have been supporting this. The Committee are making huge efforts to try and get more plot holders involved as we emerge from the Covid years when we were not being able to do as much as we wanted to as a community.

We are converting plot A13 (by the Shed) into a communal area and we are looking to offer bacon rolls and coffee/tea once a month on a Sunday - the next Sunday will be June 18^{th} . Please support this as it helps with both fund raising and getting to know fellow plot holders and using the Trading Shed.

We have been experimenting with placing both bark and manure on the communal areas for use by all and this seems to have been well received and we will continue with this - for free!

The potato planting competition is in full swing and we await the results with huge interest!!

We put a minimal mark up on all goods in the Shed as we don't have the overheads the garden centres have to cover so, before you wander to Coolings or Dobbie's, take a look on a Sunday between 10.30am and 12.30pm at what is on offer - I think you will be pleasantly surprised by the variety and the costs.

Finally, don't forget the plant sales on a Sunday - thanks to Ian and Paul the strong plants are very reasonably priced as we use the stock from the shed to grow them to keep down costs. They do this voluntarily and we all benefit from the super variety that they produce.
