From the Secretary's desk

On an historical note - well, it's that time of year

I have been given a booklet called 'A short history of West Wickham Allotments from 1912 to 1975'. This is really interesting and a copy is held in the Trading Shed if you like to see it.

Here are a few examples from the history:

No records appear to exist of the origin of the Allotments but some tenants told Mr Jefferies, who had a plot on the allotment from 1931 to his retirement in 1975, that the Allotments were created in 1912. The history is composed from the Minute Books and the memories of Mr Jefferies.

A field on the Hawes Lane frontage was taken in 1912 and divided into plots, 1-65, (65 being a herb garden). A second field was acquired between the first field and the sports ground in 1918 and divided into plots 66 to 94, making a total of 7.25 acres. These fields were probably part of Church Rectory land. The first mention of rent for the whole site was £14 15s 3d paid to the Rector from October 1926 until 1937. A rent of £12 per half year was paid to Mr G Rogers in 1936 but from 1937 it was completely taken over by Beckenham Council until 2019 when we became a limited company and rent is now paid to Bromley Council. Some of the Allotment land was lost in 1935 in order for Glebe Way to be built and in 1936 Hawes Lane was widened changing a lane into a road which also used some of the Allotment site. In the 1970s the demand for Allotments increased until there were 50 people on the waiting list. The Trading Shed was built in 1938, built of timber with roofing felt and in 1974 a garage was kindly donated which increased the size of the trading shed. During the war the site where the lockers are was used for raising pigs. How things have changed!
